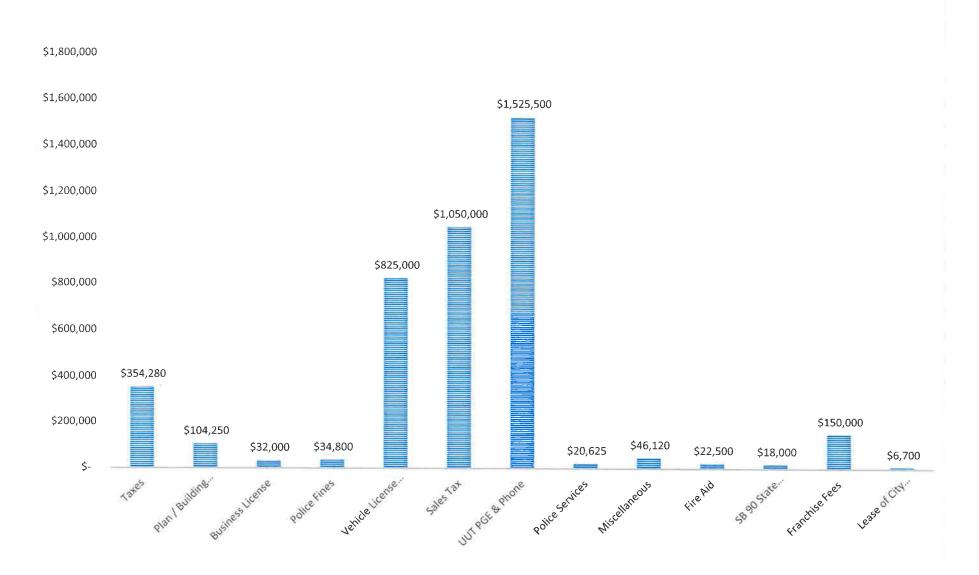

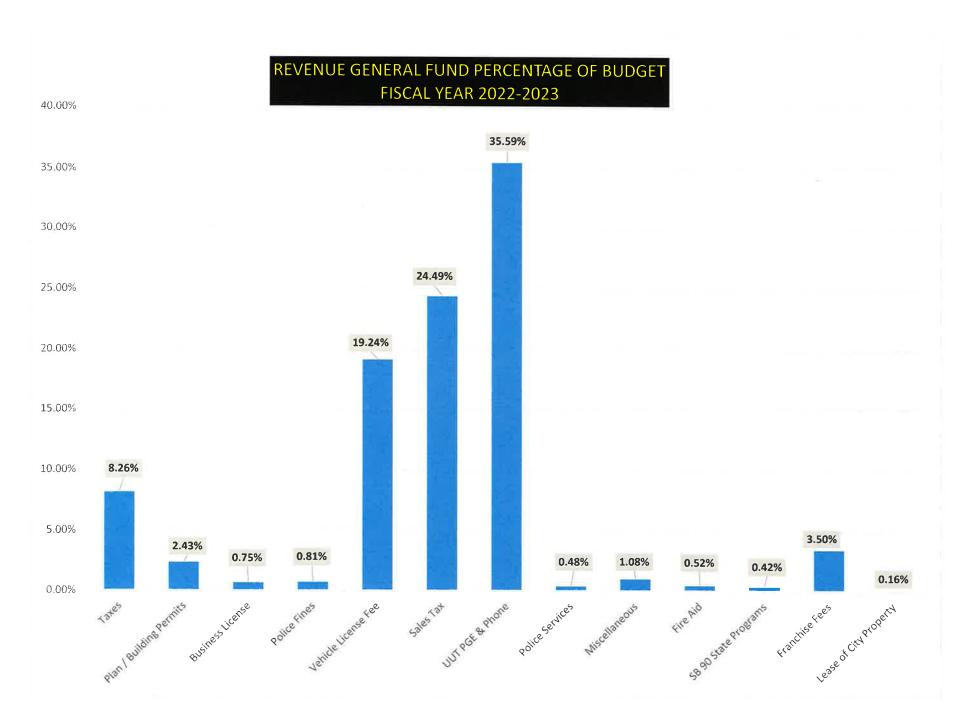

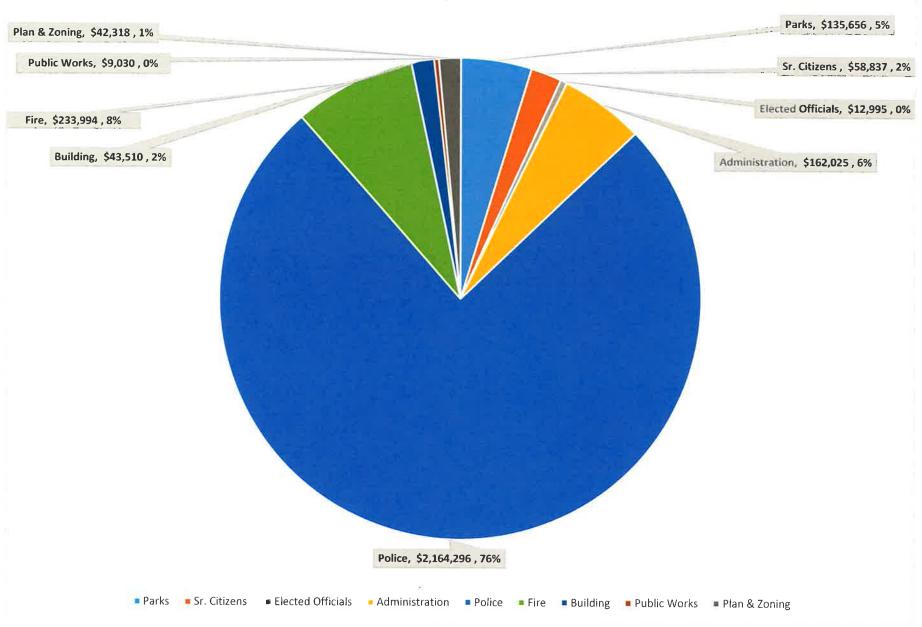
REVENUE GENERAL FUND OF BUDGET FISCAL YEAR 2022-2023

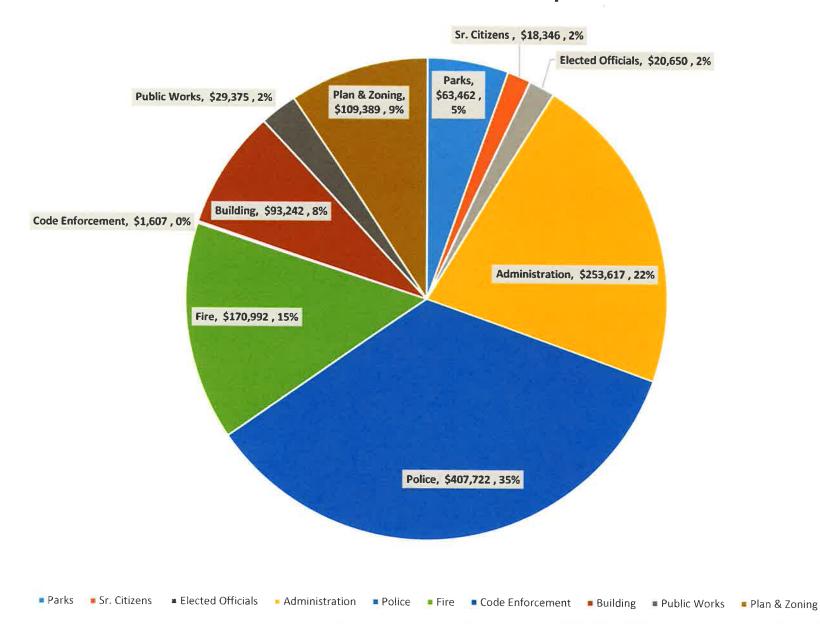








General Fund FY2022-2023 Expenses

AND 2022 ANNUAL MILITARY EQUIPMENT USE REPORT, AND RENEWAL OF

ORDINANCE 22-03 AND POLICY 708.

RECOMMENDATION

Review the 2022 Annual Military Equipment Use Report and Approve Resolution 23-24 Renewing Ordinance 22-03 and Police Department Policy 708, in accordance with AB 481.

BACKGROUND

Assembly Bill 481 (AB 481) codified Government Code sections 7070 through 7075 requiring a law enforcement agency (LEA) to obtain approval from the applicable governing body, via the adoption of a "military equipment" use policy by ordinance, before obtaining funding, acquiring, or using military equipment.

That items are deemed "military equipment" by AB 481 does not necessarily indicate the equipment is used by the military. Rather, this equipment is a component of general best practices for LEAs nationwide. These tools have been tested in the field and are used by LEAs to enhance community and officer safety. Loss of these items would jeopardize the community's and peace officers' welfare within the Firebaugh Police Department.

On June 20, 2022, the City Council adopted Ordinance 22-03, which adopted Police Department Policy 708 and authorized the use, funding, and acquisition of specifically identified military equipment in accordance with Policy 708. The purpose of Policy 708 is to safeguard the public's welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties. This Policy also ensures that there are adequate safeguards in place for the use of such equipment, including transparency, oversight, and accountability. As required by AB 481, Policy 708 has been posted on the Department's website.

AB 481 also requires the Department to annually submit a military equipment report for each approved type of military equipment to the City Council for as long as the military equipment is available for use. The Annual Report must be presented to and reviewed by the City Council at a regular meeting each year, and the City Council must determine at the annual meeting whether each type of military equipment identified in the report continues to comply with the standard of approval and determine whether to renew the ordinance approving Policy 708. This report must contain the following information for the City Council's review:

- A summary of how the Military Equipment was used and the purpose of its use.
- A summary of any complaints or concerns received concerning the Military Equipment.
- The results of any internal audits, any information about violations of the Military Equipment Use Policy, and any actions taken in response.
- The total annual cost of each type of Military Equipment, including acquisition, personnel, training, transportation, maintenance, storage, upgrade, and other ongoing expenses, and from what source funds will be provided for the Military Equipment in the calendar year following submission of the annual Military Equipment Report.
- The quantity possessed for each type of Military Equipment.
- If the law enforcement agency intends to acquire additional Military Equipment in the next year, the quantity sought for each type of Military Equipment.

If Ordinance 22-03 and Policy 708 are renewed by the City Council, Policy 708 will remain posted and publicly available on the Department's website, along with the Annual Report, for as long as the military equipment is available for use. As required by AB 481, within 30 days of submitting the Annual Report to City Council, the Department will also hold at least one well-publicized and conveniently located community engagement meeting, at which the general public may discuss and ask questions regarding the Annual Report and the Department's funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact from renewal of Ordinance 22-03 and Policy 708. The purchase of any future equipment considered "military equipment" will be brought to the Firebaugh City Council in a prepared staff report or as part of the annual budget proposal.

PRIOR COUNCIL ACTIONS

On June 20, 2022, the Firebaugh City Council adopted Ordinance 22-03 adding section 2-4 to the Firebaugh Municipal Code, "Military Equipment," and adopting the Firebaugh Policy Department Policy 708.

ORDINANCE NO. 22-03

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FIREBAUGH ADDING A NEW SUBSECTION TO SECTION 2-4 OF CHAPTER 2 OF THE FIREBAUGH MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING POLICE ACQUISITION AND USE OF "MILITARY EQUIPMENT"

WHEREAS, on September 30, 2021, California Assembly Bill 481 ("AB 481") was signed into law; and

WHEREAS, AB 481 and Government Code sections 7070, through 7072 require that the City Council of the City of Firebaugh approve a Military Equipment Use Policy by ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the amendment of Section 2-4 (Law Enforcement) of Chapter 2 (Administration), to add Subsection 2-4.4 (Military Equipment Use Ordinance) is necessary to comply with the requirements of AB 481 and Government Code Sections 7070 through 7072.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Firebaugh as follows:

SECTION 1. Subsection 2-4.4, of Section 2-4, of Chapter 2 of the Firebaugh Municipal Code is hereby added to read as follows:

SECTION 2-4

LAW ENFORCEMENT

Subsection 2-4.4 "MILITARY EQUIPMENT" USE ORDINANCE

- 2-4.4.1: NAME OF ORDINANCE
- 2-4.4.2: FINDINGS AND DETERMINATIONS
- **2-4.4.3: DEFINITIONS**
- 2-4.4.4: MILITARY EQUIPMENT USE POLICY REQUIREMENT
- 2-4.4.5: USE IN EXIGENT CIRCUMSTANCES
- 2-4.4.6: REPORTS ON THE USE OF CONTROLLED EQUIPMENT
- 2-4.4.7: SEVERABILITY

2-4.4.1: NAME OF ORDINANCE

This Ordinance shall be known as the Military Equipment Use Ordinance.

2-4.4.2: FINDINGS AND DETERMINATIONS

- A. FINDINGS. The City Council finds:
 - 1. On September 30, 2021, Governor Gavin Newsom signed into law Assembly Bill 481, which codified procedures of funding, acquisition and use of military equipment by law enforcement agencies under Government Code sections 7070 through 7075.

- 2. Assembly Bill 481 requires law enforcement agencies to obtain approval from the applicable governing body by ordinance adopting a military equipment use policy prior to taking certain actions relating to funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment.
- 3. Assembly Bill 481 allows a city council of a city to approve the funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment within its jurisdiction only if it makes specified determinations pursuant to Government Code section 7071.
- 4. Assembly Bill 481 requires law enforcement agencies to annually submit to the applicable governing body a military equipment report for each approved type of military equipment for as long as the military equipment is available for use, and to make each annual report publicly available on its website for as long as the equipment is available for use.
- 5. Assembly Bill 481 requires a city council that has adopted an ordinance approving a military equipment use policy to annually review the military equipment report submitted by the law enforcement agency to determine whether each type of military equipment identified in the report continues to comply with the standard of approval.
- 6. Assembly Bill 481 requires a city council that has adopted an ordinance approving a military equipment use policy to annually review the ordinance and vote on whether to renew the ordinance at a regular meeting.
- 7. Policy 708 of the Firebaugh Police Department Policy Manual has been prepared by the Firebaugh Police Department as its proposed military equipment use policy, and it has been published on the Firebaugh Police Department's internet website since May 1, 2022.
- 8. A duly noticed public hearing was conducted by the City Council at its regular meeting on June 7, 2022, to consider and adopt Policy 708.
- B. DETERMINATIONS. Based on the above-findings and the information provided to the City Council at the public meeting, the City Council determines that Policy 708 of the Firebaugh Police Department Policy Manual complies with standards for approval under Government Code section 7071:
 - 1. The identified military equipment is necessary because there is no reasonable alternative that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety.
 - 2. Policy 708 of the Firebaugh Police Department Policy Manual will safeguard the public's welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties.
 - 3. The purchase and use of the military equipment identified in Exhibit A of Policy 708 is reasonably cost effective compared to available alternatives that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety.
 - 4. All military equipment uses prior to the adoption of Policy 708 of the Firebaugh Police Department Policy Manual complied with applicable Department policy in effect at that time and will continue to conform with future compliance.
 - 5. Policy 708 of the Firebaugh Police Department Policy Manual is approved and adopted.

2-4.4.3: DEFINITIONS

- A. "Military Equipment" includes all of the following (Gov. Code §7070):
 - 1. Unmanned, remotely piloted, powered aerial or ground vehicles.
 - 2. Mine-resistant ambush-protected ("MRAP") vehicles or armored personnel carriers. However, police versions of standard consumer vehicles are specifically excluded from this subdivision.
 - 3. High mobility multipurpose wheeled vehicles ("HMMWV"), commonly referred to as Humvees, two and one-half-ton trucks, five-ton trucks, or wheeled vehicles that have a breaching or entry apparatus attached. However, unarmored all-terrain vehicles ("ATVs") and motorized dirt bikes are specifically excluded from this subdivision.
 - 4. Tracked armored vehicles that provide ballistic protection to their occupants and utilize a tracked system instead of wheels for forward motion.
 - 5. Command and control vehicles that are either built or modified to facilitate the operational control and direction of public safety units.
 - 6. Weaponized aircraft, vessels, or vehicles of any kind.
 - 7. Battering rams, slugs, and breaching apparatuses that are explosive in nature. However, items designed to remove a lock, such as bolt cutters, or a handheld ram designed to be operated by one person, are specifically excluded from this subdivision.
 - 8. Firearms of .50 caliber or greater. However, standard issue shotguns are specifically excluded from this subdivision.
 - 9. Ammunition of .50 caliber or greater. However, standard issue shotgun ammunition is specifically excluded from this subdivision.
 - 10. Specialized firearms and ammunition of less than .50 caliber, including assault weapons as defined in sections 30510 and 30515 of the Penal Code, with the exception of standard issue service weapons and ammunition of less than .50 caliber that are issued to officers, agents, or employees of a law enforcement agency or a state agency.
 - 11. Any firearm or firearm accessory that is designed to launch explosive projectiles.
 - 12. "Flashbang" grenades and explosive breaching tools, "tear gas," and "pepper balls," excluding standard, service-issued handheld pepper spray.
 - 13. Taser Shockwave, microwave weapons, water cannons, and the Long-Range Acoustic Device ("LRAD").
 - 14. The following projectile launch platforms and their associated munitions: 40mm projectile launchers, "bean bag", rubber bullet, and specialty impact munition ("SIM") weapons.
 - 15. Any other equipment as determined by a governing body or a state agency to require additional oversight.

- 16. Notwithstanding paragraphs (1) through (15), "Military Equipment" does not include general equipment not designated as prohibited or controlled by the federal Defense Logistics Agency.
- B. "City" means any department, agency, bureau, and/or subordinate division of the City of Firebaugh.
- C. "Police Department" means any division, section, bureau, employee, volunteer and/or contractor of the Firebaugh Police Department.
- D. "City Council" means the governing body that is the Firebaugh City Council.
- E. "Military Equipment Use Policy" means a publicly released, written document that includes, at a minimum, all of the following:
 - 1. A description of each type of Military Equipment, the quantity sought, its capabilities, expected lifespan, and product descriptions from the manufacturer of the Military Equipment.
 - 2. The purposes and authorized uses for which the law enforcement agency or the state agency proposes to use each type of Military Equipment.
 - 3. The fiscal impact of each type of Military Equipment, including the initial costs of obtaining the equipment and estimated annual costs of maintaining the equipment.
 - 4. The legal and procedural rules that govern each authorized use.
 - The training, including any course required by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training, that must be completed before any officer, agent, or employee of the law enforcement agency or the state agency is allowed to use each specific type of Military Equipment to ensure the full protection of the public's welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties and full adherence to the Military Equipment use policy.
 - 6. The mechanisms to ensure compliance with the Military Equipment use policy, including which independent persons or entities have oversight authority, and, if applicable, what legally enforceable sanctions are put in place for violations of the policy.
 - 7. For a law enforcement agency, the procedures by which members of the public may register complaints or concerns or submit questions about the use of each specific type of Military Equipment, and how the law enforcement agency will ensure that each complaint, concern, or question receives a response in a timely manner.
- F. "Exigent Circumstances" means a law enforcement agency's good faith belief that an emergency involving the danger of, or imminent threat of death or serious physical injury to any person is occurring, has occurred, or is about to occur.
- G. "State agency" means the law enforcement division of every state office, officer, department, division, bureau, board, and commission or other state body or agency, except those agencies provided for in Article IV (except Section 20 thereof) or Article VI of the California Constitution.
- H. "Type" means each item that shares the same manufacturer model number.

2-4.4.4: MILITARY EQUIPMENT USE POLICY REQUIREMENT

- A. The Firebaugh Police Department shall obtain approval of the City Council, by an ordinance adopting a Military Equipment Use Policy ("MEUP") at a regular meeting of the City Council held pursuant to the Ralph M. Brown Act (Chapter 9 (commencing with section 54950) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5), prior to engaging in any of the following:
 - Requesting Military Equipment made available pursuant to section 2576a of Title 10 of the United States Code.
 - Seeking funds for Military Equipment, including, but not limited to, applying for a grant, soliciting or accepting private, local, state, or federal funds, in-kind donations, or other donations or transfers.
 - 3. Acquiring Military Equipment either permanently or temporarily, including by borrowing or leasing.
 - 4. Collaborating with another law enforcement agency in the deployment or other use of Military Equipment within the territorial jurisdiction of the City of Firebaugh.
 - 5. Using any new or existing Military Equipment for a purpose, in a manner, or by a person not previously approved by the governing body pursuant to this chapter.
 - 6. Soliciting or responding to a proposal for, or entering into an agreement with, any other person or entity to seek funds for, apply to receive, acquire, use, or collaborate in the use of, Military Equipment.
 - 7. Acquiring Military Equipment through any means not provided by this section.
- B. No later than May 1, 2022, if seeking to continue the use of any Military Equipment that was acquired prior to January 1, 2022, the Firebaugh Police Department shall commence a City Council approval process in accordance with this section. If the City Council does not approve the continuing use of Military Equipment, including by adoption pursuant to a Military Equipment Use Policy submitted pursuant to this code, within 180 days of submission of the proposed Military Equipment Use Policy to City Council, the Firebaugh Police Department shall cease its use of the Military Equipment until it receives the approval of City Council in accordance with this code.
- C. In seeking the approval of City Council, the Firebaugh Police Department shall submit a proposed Military Equipment Use Policy to City Council and make those documents available on the Police Department's internet website at least 30 days prior to any public hearing concerning the Military Equipment at issue.
- D. The governing body shall consider a proposed Military Equipment Use policy as an agenda item for an open session of a regular meeting and provide for public comment in accordance with the Ralph M. Brown Act (Chapter 9 (commencing with section 54950) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5).

- E. The governing body shall only approve a Military Equipment Use Policy pursuant to this subsection if it determines all of the following:
 - 1. The Military Equipment is necessary because there is no reasonable alternative that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety.
 - 2. The proposed Military Equipment use policy will safeguard the public's welfare, safety, civil rights, and civil liberties.
 - 3. If purchasing the equipment, the equipment is reasonably cost effective compared to available alternatives that can achieve the same objective of officer and civilian safety.
 - 4. Prior Military Equipment use complied with the Military Equipment Use Policy that was in effect at the time, or if prior uses did not comply with the accompanying Military Equipment Use Policy, corrective action has been taken to remedy nonconforming uses and ensure future compliance.
- F. In order to facilitate public participation, any proposed or final Military Equipment Use Policy shall be made publicly available on the internet website of the Police Department for as long as the Military Equipment is available for use.
- G. The City Council shall review any ordinance that is has adopted pursuant to this subsection approving the funding, acquisition, or use of Military Equipment at least annually and vote on whether to renew the ordinance at a regular meeting held pursuant to the Ralph M. Brown Act (Chapter 9 (commencing with section 54950) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5).

2-4.4.5: USE IN EXIGENT CIRCUMSTANCES

- A. Notwithstanding the provisions of this subsection, the Police Department may acquire, borrow and/or use Military Equipment in Exigent Circumstances without following the requirements of this code.
- B. If the Police Department acquires, borrows, and/or uses Military Equipment in Exigent Circumstances, in accordance with this section, it must take all of the following actions:
 - 1. Provide written notice of that acquisition or use to the City Council within 30 days following the commencement of such Exigent Circumstance, unless such information is confidential or privileged under local, state or federal law.
 - 2. If it is anticipated that the use will continue beyond the Exigent Circumstance, submit a proposed amended Military Equipment Use Policy to the City Council within 90 days following the borrowing, acquisition and/or use, and receive approval, as applicable, from the City Council.
 - 3. Include the Military Equipment in the Police Department's next annual Military Equipment Report.

2-4.4.6: REPORTS ON THE USE OF MILITARY EQUIPMENT

- A. The Police Department shall submit to City Council an annual Military Equipment Report for each type of Military Equipment approved by the City Council within one year of approval, and annually thereafter for as long as the Military Equipment is available for use.
- B. The Police Department shall also make each annual Military Equipment Report required by this section publicly available on its internet website for as long as the Military Equipment is available for use.
- C. The annual Military Equipment Report shall, at a minimum, include the following information for the immediately preceding calendar year for each type of Military Equipment:
 - 1. A summary of how the Military Equipment was used and the purpose of its use.
 - 2. A summary of any complaints or concerns received concerning the Military Equipment.
 - 3. The results of any internal audits, any information about violations of the Military Equipment Use Policy, and any actions taken in response.
 - 4. The total annual cost for each type of Military Equipment, including acquisition, personnel, training, transportation, maintenance, storage, upgrade, and other ongoing costs, and from what source funds will be provided for the Military Equipment in the calendar year following submission of the annual Military Equipment Report.
 - 5. The quantity possessed for each type of Military Equipment.
 - 6. If the Police Department intends to acquire additional Military Equipment in the next year, the quantity sought for each type of Military Equipment.
- D. Within 30 days of submitting and publicly releasing an annual Military Equipment Report pursuant to this section, the Police Department shall hold at least one well-publicized and conveniently located community engagement meeting, at which the general public may discuss and ask questions regarding the annual Military Equipment report and the law enforcement agency's funding, acquisition, or use of Military Equipment.
- E. The City Council shall determine, based on the annual Military Equipment Report submitted pursuant to this subsection, whether each type of Military Equipment identified in that report has complied with the standards for approval set forth in this code and the Military Equipment Use Policy. If the City Council determines that a type of Military Equipment identified in the annual Military Equipment Report has not complied with the standards for approval, the City Council shall either disapprove a renewal of the authorization of or that type of Military Equipment or require modification to the Military Equipment Use Policy in a manner that will resolve the lack of compliance.

2-4.4.7: SEVERABILITY

A. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this subsection, or any application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a decision of a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions or applications of this subsection.

B. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this subsection and each and every section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, and word not declared invalid or unconstitutional without regard to whether any other portion of this subsection or application thereof would be subsequently declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its adoption.

SECTION 3. The City Clerk is directed to cause this ordinance or a summary of this ordinance to be published once in a newspaper of general circulation published and circulated within the City of Firebaugh, within fifteen (15) days after its adoption. If a summary of the ordinance is published, the City Clerk shall cause a certified copy of the full text of the proposed ordinance to be posted in the office of the City Clerk at least five (5) days prior to the Council meeting at which the ordinance is adopted and again after the meeting at which the ordinance is adopted. The summary shall be approved by the City Attorney.

Military Equipment

708.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines for the approval, acquisition, and reporting requirements of military equipment (Government Code § 7070; Government Code § 7071; Government Code § 7072).

708.1.1 DEFINITIONS

Definitions related to this policy include (Government Code § 7070):

Governing body – The elected or appointed body that oversees the [Department/Office].

Military equipment – Includes but is not limited to the following:

- Unmanned, remotely piloted, powered aerial or ground vehicles.
- Mine-resistant ambush-protected (MRAP) vehicles or armored personnel carriers.
- High mobility multipurpose wheeled vehicles (HMMWV), two-and-one-half-ton trucks, five-ton trucks, or wheeled vehicles that have a breaching or entry apparatus attached.
- Tracked armored vehicles that provide ballistic protection to their occupants.
- Command and control vehicles that are either built or modified to facilitate the operational control and direction of public safety units.
- Weaponized aircraft, vessels, or vehicles of any kind.
- Battering rams, slugs, and breaching apparatuses that are explosive in nature. This does not include a handheld, one-person ram.
- Firearms and ammunition of .50 caliber or greater, excluding standard-issue shotguns and standard-issue shotgun ammunition.
- Specialized firearms and ammunition of less than .50 caliber, including firearms and accessories identified as assault weapons in Penal Code § 30510 and Penal Code § 30515, with the exception of standard-issue firearms.
- Any firearm or firearm accessory that is designed to launch explosive projectiles.
- Noise-flash diversionary devices and explosive breaching tools.
- Munitions containing tear gas or OC, excluding standard, service-issued handheld pepper spray.
- TASER® Shockwave, microwave weapons, water cannons, and long-range acoustic devices (LRADs).
- Kinetic energy weapons and munitions.
- Any other equipment as determined by a governing body or a state agency to require additional oversight.

Notwithstanding Government Code 7070 paragraphs (1) through (15). "Military Equipment" does not include general equipment not designated prohibited or controlled by the federal defense logistics agency.

708.2 POLICY

It is the policy of the Firebaugh Police Department that members of this department comply with the provisions of Government Code § 7071 with respect to military equipment.

708.3 MILITARY EQUIPMENT COORDINATOR

The Chief of Police should designate a member of this department to act as the military equipment coordinator. The responsibilities of the military equipment coordinator include but are not limited to:

- Acting as liaison to the governing body for matters related to the requirements of this policy.
- Identifying [department/office] equipment that qualifies as military equipment in the current possession of the [Department/Office], or the equipment the [Department/ Office] intends to acquire that requires approval by the governing body.
- (c) Conducting an inventory of all military equipment at least annually.
- Collaborating with any allied agency that may use military equipment within the jurisdiction of Firebaugh Police Department (Government Code § 7071).
- Preparing for, scheduling, and coordinating the annual community engagement meeting to include:
 - 1. Publicizing the details of the meeting.
 - Preparing for public questions regarding the [department/office]'s funding, 2. acquisition, and use of equipment.
- (f) Preparing the annual military equipment report for submission to the Chief of Police and ensuring that the report is made available on the [department/office] website (Government Code § 7072).
- Establishing the procedure for a person to register a complaint or concern, or how that (g) person may submit a question about the use of a type of military equipment, and how the [Department/Office] will respond in a timely manner.

708.4 MILITARY EQUIPMENT INVENTORY

The following constitutes a list of qualifying equipment for the [Department/Office]:

708.5 APPROVAL

The Chief of Police or the authorized designee shall obtain approval from the governing body by way of an ordinance adopting the military equipment policy. As part of the approval process, the Chief of Police or the authorized designee shall ensure the proposed military equipment policy is submitted to the governing body and is available on the [department/office] website at least 30 Firebaugh PD Policy Manual

days prior to any public hearing concerning the military equipment at issue (Government Code § 7071). The military equipment policy must be approved by the governing body prior to engaging in any of the following (Government Code § 7071):

- (a) Requesting military equipment made available pursuant to 10 USC § 2576a.
- (b) Seeking funds for military equipment, including but not limited to applying for a grant, soliciting or accepting private, local, state, or federal funds, in-kind donations, or other donations or transfers.
- (c) Acquiring military equipment either permanently or temporarily, including by borrowing or leasing.
- (d) Collaborating with another law enforcement agency in the deployment or other use of military equipment within the jurisdiction of this [department/office].
- (e) Using any new or existing military equipment for a purpose, in a manner, or by a person not previously approved by the governing body.
- (f) Soliciting or responding to a proposal for, or entering into an agreement with, any other person or entity to seek funds for, apply to receive, acquire, use, or collaborate in the use of military equipment.
- (g) Acquiring military equipment through any means not provided above.

708.6 COORDINATION WITH OTHER JURISDICTIONS

Military equipment should not be used by any other law enforcement agency or member in this jurisdiction unless the military equipment is approved for use in accordance with this policy.

708.7 ANNUAL REPORT

Upon approval of a military equipment policy, the Chief of Police or the authorized designee should submit a military equipment report to the governing body for each type of military equipment approved within one year of approval, and annually thereafter for as long as the military equipment is available for use (Government Code § 7072).

The Chief of Police or the authorized designee should also make each annual military equipment report publicly available on the [department/office] website for as long as the military equipment is available for use. The report shall include all information required by Government Code § 7072 for the preceding calendar year for each type of military equipment in [department/office] inventory.

708.8 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Within 30 days of submitting and publicly releasing the annual report, the [Department/Office] shall hold at least one well-publicized and conveniently located community engagement meeting, at which the [Department/Office] should discuss the report and respond to public questions regarding the funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FIREBAUGH RENEWING ORDINANCE 22-03 AND POLICY 708 OF THE FIREBAUGH POLICE DEPARTMENT POLICY MANUAL AUTHORIZING THE USE MILITARY EQUIPMENT IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 7070, ET SEQ.

WHEREAS, the City Council adopted Firebaugh Police Department Policy 708 (Military Equipment and Use) with the adoption of Ordinance 22-03 on June 20, 2022; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Government Code section 7070, et seq., enacted by AB 481, the Police Department has prepared the 2023 Annual Military Equipment Report ("Annual Report"), which is incorporated herein by reference, for review by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, at its regular meeting on June 19, 2023, the City Council duly reviewed the Annual Report, Ordinance 22-03, and Policy 708, and reviewed the associated staff report, and considered all public input and other information pertaining to the Annual Report and the authorization to use military equipment presented at the meeting.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Firebaugh determines and resolves as follows:

- 1. Based on the Annual Report, the City Council determines that each type of military equipment identified in the Annual Report has complied with the applicable standards for approval as set forth in Government Code section 7071, subd. (d).
- 2. Policy 708 of the Police Department Manual and Ordinance 22-03, which adopted Policy 708 on June 20, 2022, are hereby renewed.

2022 ANNUAL MILITARY EQUIPMENT USE REPORT

This Annual Military Equipment Use Report is made pursuant Government Code section 7072, City of Firebaugh Ordinance 22-03, and Firebaugh Police Department ("Department") Policy 708.

EQUIPMENT TYPE:

UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEMS (UAS/DRONES)

SUMMARY OF EQUIPMENT USE AND PURPOSE OF TTS USE

UAS/Drones enhance the department's mission of protecting lives and property when other means and resources are not available or are less effective. Uses may include but are not limited to search and rescue, suspect apprehension, crime scene documentation, tactical operations, scene security, hazard monitoring, identification and mitigation response to emergency calls, crisis communication, and legally authorized surveillance.

In 2022, the Department used UAS's 11 times in field searches for suspects, search warrant service, aerial photography of city properties and to aid in the response to one (1) burglary in progress.

COMPLAINTS OR CONCERNS RECEIVED

No complaints were received, or concerns brought to the attention of the Department.

RESULTS OF INTERNAL AUDITS OR VIOLATIONS OF USE POLICY

No internal audits were completed and there were no violations of policy reported or observed.

TOTAL ANNUAL COST

For 2022, the initial cost of equipment, licensing, software, and training for the UAS's was approximately \$10,000. The ongoing costs associated with UAS operation and maintenance was approximately \$1,000, the majority of which was from payment of drone pilot call-out overtime.

QUANTITY OWNED

Currently, the Department owns three (3) UAS's.

- 1 DJI Mavic Enterprise Pro Platinum
- * 2 DJI Mavic Air 2

INTENTION TO PURCHASE SIMILAR EQUIPMENT

The Police Department intends to purchase through grant funding a new drone in early 2024 and a license to allow live footage streaming. The equipment will be brought to the City Council for approval once cost and type of drone are finalized.

PATROL

Patrol currently has full-time officers who are responsible for providing complete police services to the citizens of Firebaugh. The patrol division is broken down into one sergeant, two corporals and nine patrol officers.

Patrol officers respond to calls for service, conduct their own investigations, conduct traffic enforcement, investigate traffic accidents, write reports, conduct proactive enforcement, write and serve search warrants, and officers also participate in community events.







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AGENCY'S OVERVIEW

DISPATCH

The Firebaugh Dispatch Center currently has four full-time dispatchers, one lead dispatcher and three part-time dispatchers. The lead dispatcher is currently assigned to serve as the department records supervisor.

The Dispatch Center serves as the primary Public Safety Answering Point for all 9-1-1 calls and the primary communications center for the city.

Dispatchers are responsible for:

- dispatching officers to emergency and routine calls for service
- answering 911 emergency and non-emergency calls
- handling radio traffic from patrol and fire department
- contacting other law enforcement agencies, as needed
- dispatch fire and emergency medical services
- handling lobby traffic, inquiries, and release of police documents
- preparing and submitting reports to District Attorney's Office and Superior Courts for filing.
- At the end of 2022, the department handled over 2,750 reports.





RESERVE OFFICER UNIT

The Firebaugh Police Reserve Officer Program has been utilized within the City of Firebaugh dating back to the early 1960's.

Reserve officers often cover patrol shifts, transport arrestees and work security events. The program consists of one sergeant, and five reserve officers. We are currently recruiting applicants to fill vacancies in the program.

EXPLORER PROGRAM

The Firebaugh Police Explorer Program provides young people with solid information about the adult world they are preparing to enter. The program gives today's teenagers a chance to learn firsthand about a wide variety of careers in law enforcement. In addition, police explorers receive training in leadership, police tactics, safety, dispatch, administrative tasks, and volunteering during many community events.

The explorer program currently has six active members. Many of our past explorers are now law enforcement officers or have been successful working in many other fields. Anyone interested in becoming a police explorer is encouraged to apply at the police department or speak to one of explorer advisors.







K-9 UNIT

The department K-9 "Kona" is currently assigned to Officer Jorge Zaragoza. K-9 Kona is a narcotics dog most often involved in community presentations and drug searches.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

Firebaugh Police Department is responsible for enforcing the city's municipal code. The department currently has one part-time code enforcement officer who works 32 hours per week. The code enforcement officer is a sworn reserve police officer with peace officer powers. The city is in the process of changing the position to a full-time job at the start of the 2023/2024 fiscal year budget. Code enforcement has been instrumental in enforcing unpermitted construction, weed control, zoning, local parking laws and animal control.



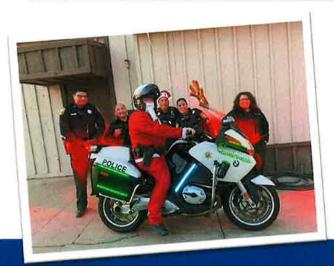


DRONE PROGRAM



The department's drones have been instrumental in building searches, assisting during search warrant service, aerial photography, and many other assignments. Currently the department has one certified licensed pilot, and we have two officers who have been training for certification.

MOTORCYCLE UNIT AND BICYCLE UNIT



The department's motorcycle is currently assigned to Reserve Officer Lee, who has a class M license.

The bicycle unit has been inactive for two years; however, with current interest from a few reserve officers, the program will be reimplemented.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The department has actively coordinated several community events, targeting the children and the families, of Firebaugh.

Firebaugh PAL is an organization that has worked to foster positive relationships and build bonds between youth and law enforcement. With this program, we are uniquely situated to bring our community together to strengthen bonds, and change behaviors to create safe and healthy relationships.

Currently, Firebaugh PAL has a successful boys and girls, 5-12, soccer program, and awarded \$2,500.00 in scholarships to three 2022 graduating Firebaugh High School Seniors. Community support and annual fund-raising keep the program thriving.

2022 CRIME OVERVIEW

The Firebaugh Police Department 2022 Annual Report is provided to the Council and our community, as an overview of our crime fighting efforts based on the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) and Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR) data.

The U.S. Department of Justice changed the UCR Data Collection System to NIBRS Data Collection System three years ago. The change of UCR to NIBRS will require more detailed, accurate, and meaningful data. The data is collected about when and where crime takes place, what form it takes, and the characteristics of its victims and perpetrators. Therefore, it is not uncommon for the numbers shown in the UCR to differ from those taken from NIBRS Data Analysis System. The implementation of NIBRS is expected to provide consistency throughout the U.S. for quantifying crimes.

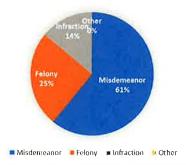

The attached tables to this annual report, include UCR data for the last three years.

During the 2022 year, the City of Firebaugh experienced an increase and a decrease in some of the reportable offense categories compared to 2020 and 2021. The increase was most notably in aggravated assault, simple assault, petty theft, and vandalism. The decrease was in auto theft, larceny, and burglary.

Crime breakdown over the past three years: 61% misdemeanor, 25% felony and the 14% infraction.





2022 CRIME OVERVIEW

Most of the aggravated assaults and simple assaults were closed with a suspect identified and/or arrested. The numbers appear inflated due to NIBRS reporting requirements and not UCR. Most of the aggravated assaults, the suspect was known by the victim and not random attacks on citizens.

Vandalism continues to be an area of concern for the Firebaugh Police Department. In 2022, we saw the highest number of vandalism reports compared to two past years. However, vandalism reports dropped significantly at the end of 2022, after officers served several search warrants and arrested individuals responsible.

Although, vandalisms may be considered minor, the department will investigate all vandalism incidents, something that many other agencies do not do.

Arson doubled in 2022, compared to the past three years. Most arson reports are related to trash bins contents set on fire in alleys and local parks. Arson dropped significantly after the arrest of two juveniles who were identified as the subjects responsible for most of the arsons.

During 2022 and continuing into 2023, shoplifting has been an ongoing issue for most cities in the state. In Firebaugh, our shoplifting reports tripled compared to other years. Our investigations revealed that most of the shoplifters were not local. Officers were able to identify a group of individuals who led officers in a high-speed pursuit outside of the city. The department is committed to stopping retail theft, and we will pursue all leads to identify the subjects involved.

Most property crimes reported have led officers to other cities within neighboring counties. Often, individuals come into smaller communities to commit theft and leave the area, hoping police will not be able to identify them, or that the police do not have the resources to find them.

The Firebaugh Police Department will follow all leads and work with neighboring law enforcement agencies to bring suspects to justice.



2022 CRIME OVERVIEW

HOW SAFE IS FIREBAUGH?

If you are looking to move or buy real estate in Firebaugh, then you will be asking how safe is the city? None of us want to live in a place where crime could affect your quality of life.

Yes, the City of Firebaugh is considered a safe place to live, with a low crime rate compared to other cities of its size. The city is considered family friendly and an excellent place to raise a family.

During our annual Cantaloupe Festival, community members and citizens residing in neighboring communities took a survey, and it revealed some interesting data. Firebaugh citizens feel safe, in their family friendly city. They feel Firebaugh is a good place to raise a family and disclosed that they would never relocate to another city. While people who resided in neighboring communities, who took the survey, disclosed their desire to reside in Firebaugh. Their reasoning was based on the city's low crime rate. However, many commented there was a lack of available housing.

Firebaugh continues to be a very safe community, though we did experience increases in several crime types, including aggravated assault, simple assault, petty theft, and vandalism. In 2023, we continue to work diligently to further our crime reduction efforts through problem solving in collaboration with our community, and through progressive police work. We will also continue our important work with our public safety partners, and community to ensure that we are doing our best to keep our community safe.
